Phil Desbien, Rising Costs of Electricity

Desbien: My electric bill has gone up approximately 150% since Eversource became my supplier of electricity. Please see the attached detailed bill. Eversource billed me \$62.18 for "Generation Service Charge and \$44.41 for "Delivery' on 437 KWH. I have done extensive research on line and there is a bunch of rhetoric at the state level but not much is being accomplished. Deregulation has cost the people of the Town of Montague a lot of money. We pay \$0.1016/KWH for Delivery and \$0.1423/KWH "Generation Service Charge". It will cost me an extra \$533 per year for "Delivery" before paying for electricity. I am on a fixed income and that \$533 will have to come from my food budget. My average KWH usage is below average Town of Montague KWH usage. The average Town of Montague customer usage is 540 KWH/ month. There are 3,844 homes in the Town of Montague. 540 X \$.1016 X 12 X 3,844 ~ \$1,981,511/yr of delivery charge from, Eversource. What are we paying for? We can shop for cheaper electric rates but the "Delivery Service Charge stays at \$0.1016/KWH. The \$0.1423/KWH X 540KWH/mo x 12 mo. X 3,844 customers =\$3,544,567/yr for Generation is marginally variable. As Of April 20, 2015 Delivery . \$1,981,511 Generation \$3,544,567 Total of \$5,526,078 per year of f110ney out of the pockets of Montague tax payers.

Eversource is able to charge a Delivery Service Charge because Northeast Utilities (Now Eversource) sold off all their generating facilities at the turn of the century but they retained ownership of the transmission and distribution lines. The electricity we purchase must get to our homes via Eversource transmission lines and therefore the Delivery charge will NEVER go away. We may take the option to purchase electricity from other suppliers and maybe save \$10.00/mo. But that is all we can do.

The electric customers in Massachusetts are free to purchase electricity from any source available. Our default supplier is Eversource. PUC accepted the bids for electricity supply for the past six months even though they were way out of line. They should have been in the \$0.14/KWH but the electricity generators reasoning was that the cost to generate with natural gas was going to escalate and the generators wanted to hedge their bids. Natural gas prices did not increase. The electricity generators made huge profits. My estimated Generator service charge for the customers in Massachusetts is \$2,774,895,060/yr. (2.77 billion dollars). Cabot station generates approximately 62 MW at a cost of approximately \$0.11/KW. 62000 KWH at \$0.11 = \$6820 generating cost per hour. Sell at \$0.21 x 62000 =\$13020. \$13020 -\$6820 = \$6200 profit per hour. Table 8.4 The generating companies made huge profits. Those profits are reflected in the share holder's stock dividends. Eversource executives probably do not have stock in Firstlight or Western Mass Electric or vice versa or, or. Naaa From Wikipedia, the free encyclopedia

Deregulation actually started approximately 15 years ago. Our electric bills did not escalate until November 2014. What happened? The forecast for electricity usage in Massachusetts indicated that

. the demand would drop by 21.73% in 2015. The CEO of Eversource would not have received a one million dollar raise if Eversource's revenue dropped by 21.73%. The CEO of Firstlight would not have received his bonus if the Firstlight revenue dropped by 21.73%. Something had to be done. A simple supply and demand curve is as follows.

The CEO of Firstlight would not have received his bonus if the Firstlight revenue dropped by 21.73%. Something had to be done. A simple supply and demand curve is as follows. If supply is constant (which it is) profit may be realized by increased demand. When demand drops the price will drop. When demand increases the price will increase accordingly. Demand was forecasted to drop. The price should have gone down! We the people of Massachusetts started conserving with LED lights, compact fluorescent lights and energy efficient appliances. What is the electricity industry to do? All of the electricity generators skewed the curve by increasing prices based on some projected increase in their cost due to the projected price increase in natural gas. There was no increase in the price of natural gas. Eversource has been upgrading their transmission lines over the years. New towers, new roads to access the towers are some of the improvements. Those improvements cost money. Supply is constant. Where would they get the money? They are getting the money from us, the customers.

The people of the Town of Montague may be in a unique situation to do something about it. The Connecticut River is OUR, the people of Montague, natural resource. That ugly canal that runs through our town is stealing our natural resource. I believe The Town of Montague owns the canal. The Town of Montague should charge a delivery fee for the water to Cabot Station. I believe The Town of Montague owns the dam. We can charge a delivery fee. We have a right to quiet enjoyment of our natural resources. The pond above the power generating station is a wild life habitat and should be protected as a wetland. The rise and fall of the water level at the whim of Firstlight generation needs should be stopped immediately. The draining of the river basin during times of low river flow should be stopped immediately. Cabot Station should be shut down and turned into a museum adjoining a beautiful wetland park. Take it by imminent domain. We can come together as a Town and simply not pay any more "Delivery Charge" on our electric bills. Find a way to do it! Or just do it! We have a Town Meeting coming up. I am not an accountant but I do know something about paying taxes and asset depreciation. Eversource owns hundreds of miles of copper wire and hundreds of tons of copper. I do not know the Town tax structure evaluation for Eversource but I do know that copper wire has value. This country has seen many large corporations buy up smaller companies and sell off the assets. The price of copper is approximately \$3.00 per pound. Copper was approximately \$0.60/lb prior to the year 2004. \$3.00/lb =\$6000/ton for copper. Cabot station has tons of copper inside the building and is owned by Firstlight. Eversource has tons of copper wire and utility poles and transformers running all through the Town of Montague. The tax valuation should be based upon their assets. They have a very accurate account of their power lines. I have a right to quiet enjoyment of my property. As I look out my window I see ugly power lines and ugly power poles and an ugly power transformer. They ruin my view. As I travel throughout he Town of Montague I see ugly power lines and ugly power poles and ugly power transformers. They ruin my view. The Town of Montague should impose an inverse view tax on Eversource. Once every month an Eversource employee comes onto my property and takes a reading from my electric company electric meter. I have a right to quiet enjoyment of my property. They are trespassers. They should make an appointment with a two hour window before they come onto my property. The Town of Montague should pass a bylaw and require prior notice for all residences. The Town of Montague maintains hundreds of miles of roads. The huge and heavy trucks of Eversource travel upon our roads and cause excessive wear and tear to our roads. Eversource should pay a tax for every foot of road they travel upon \\lith their heavy vehicles. Occasionally the heavy and large trucks park on our streets and block traffic. What gives them the right to do so? The Town of Montague . should impose a huge fine on Eversourse for blocking traffic and creating a potential for traffic accidents. There was recently a great deal of cutting trees for the sole purpose of circumventing power outages caused by bent or broken branches. What gives them the right to cut my trees? The Town of Montague should file a

class action suit against Eversource for cutting trees without owner permission. I believe there are many legal remedies for harming trees of others. There is a new licensing agreement for Firstlight river use coming up. What an opportunity The level of the Connecticut River rises and falls at the whim of the Northfield Mountain pumped storage power generating station which is owned by FirstLight. The fluctuations of the river level cause undue stress on wildlife habitat and wetlands. The fluctuations of river level are a danger to the Town of Montague citizens that use the river for recreation. The fluctuations are particularly dangerous . when there is ice on the river. What gives them the right to endanger our lives?

The Town of Montague has a unique opportunity to develop a model for fighting back against the Eversource monopoly. Some of the remedies that I have put forth in this letter may be frivolous and difficult to enforce. There may be other actions to be taken. let us as a town and as a people get creative and think outside the box. There is a solution to the unfair practices of Eversource and the electricity generators. We must find it. If you, the select persons, can accomplish a solid remedy you will be on the letterman Show. We must force Eversource to negotiate a fair and just ((Delivery service charge" or eliminate it. Tax them \$3,487,276 to be given back to the people thru property tax reductions and \$3,487,276 to be used in the town general budget. We can afford to spend a little time on this project. That will get their collective attention. JUST DO IT!

Mr. Desbien is told the Board has no control of the electricity rates

Abbondanzio: We don't own the dam, we don't own the canal we don't own the resources that are used to generate the electricity or transmit it. However, we get \$117 million in value from the utility company that is just from Firstlight. That is up from \$47 million back in 2006. The assessors are doing their job in recognizing what value is out there. Right now the utility company pays 25% of all the taxes paid in the Town of Montague, so they are our top tax payer. We are recognizing the value that is out there and we are getting every single dollar that we have coming to us. All the information you brought up tonight is true, but it is all recognized in value and it is all taxed.
