- Nelson recuses himself as he has personal and financial commitments with the Westbrook family.
- The RPM is a heavy music festival held at the Rod & Gun Club.
- There were five complaints regarding the noise and many on facebook. All establishments should be treated the same
- Coll states that they followed the guidelines regarding having the music off by the correct times, and they received no complaints. They purposely aimed the sound toward the south, and they had decibel meters which indicated they were within the bounds.
- There were officers on detail on Friday and Saturday.
- Westbrook states he has plans for next year to reduce the sound level.

Chris Williams, Acting Police Chief and Tom Bergeron, DPW Superintendent

Complaint received regarding Greenfield Cross Road intersecting Greenfield Road and Hatchery Road

- Bergeron received a letter regarding an incident that resulted in road rage at the Greenfield Cross Road intersection.
- Williams states incidents like this are common in that area.
- o Williams and Bergeron are in favor of the road being closed for safety reasons.
- o Ramsey states that in the past, closing the road was an act of the Selectmen. It should be posted that the road is not being maintained by the Town. To formally abandon a road is an act of Town Meeting.
- Bergeron explains that the road had not been abandoned before because there is a sewer line under the road.
- o Bergeron suggests that the road be closed from the second resident's property to Hatchery Road.
- o Ramsey recommends posting it as a bicycle and pedestrian route.
- Nelson makes the motion to authorize the DPW to close but not abandon Greenfield Cross Road as discussed at the earliest convenience of the DPW. Boutwell seconded, approved. Boutwell - Aye, Kuklewicz-Aye, Nelson - Abstain

Complaint received regarding Montague Center traffic

- o For the last six to eight months, residents have expressed concern regarding a dangerous sidewalk.
- Singleton states that it is the homeowners' job to consistently clean the sidewalks during the winter.
 Kuklewicz suggests that perhaps the residents may want to work together to try to keep the sidewalk clear.
- o There have been requests for stop signs on Main Street, which would be a problem for truckers.
- o Residents have requested that reflective posts or cones be put up. Bergeron feels that they would be wiped out by the trucks. He asks for patience while the Town works on a solution to this issue. He will look for signs that may help, and will look into getting a more permanent speed limit sign.

Walter Ramsey, Town Planner

• DCR Tree Grant Update

- o The grant was awarded to Greenfield, Montague, and North Adams; it will provide 800 trees over the course of three to five years.
- o There was a kick-off meeting last week with Franklin Land Trust, Greenfield, the Tree Warden, and the Tree Committees from both towns.
- o The FRCOG will be hired to do a tree planting plan over the winter.
- o For trees planted in private yards, the Town will be responsible for maintaining them for the first year, after which the homeowners will be responsible.
- This is a federal program so there will be good record-keeping. Signed permission forms will be on file.
- We are coordinating with the Franklin County Tech School, which has recently started a tree nursery, to see how the two programs can fit together and supplement each other.

• Review Kearsarge Phase II design

- O Phase I is complete and solar array is partially operating; we are waiting for Eversource to give us the go-ahead to turn on the rest of the solar array. It has been generating energy since June.
- Everett Tatelbaum from Kearsarge Energy reviews Phase II, including an overview of the burn dump cap and solar project, the design and benefits to the Town, approvals and permitting, a proposed modification, construction and completion, and the next steps.
- o Permitting will start next month and construction will be in Spring 2019.
- Nelson makes the motion (1) to give permission to submit a revised site plan to the Planning Board as well as any permits that are required by the Montague Conservation Commission, (2) to authorize submission of post-closure use to the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection, and (3) to direct the Town Administrator and relevant Town staff to negotiate the ground lease agreement. Boutwell seconded, unanimously approved. Nelson Aye, Boutwell Aye, Kuklewicz Aye

• Proposed Projects for Complete Streets Implementation Grant Application

- The approved Prioritization Plan has been submitted to the State for their review. If the State reviews and approves the plan in three weeks, we will be able to apply for the Complete Streets Implementation Plan Grant, which is due on October 1st.
- o There were about 30 proposed projects. After taking public feedback and working with various Town departments, we were able to identify the top five priorities: Montague Center sidewalks, safer routes to school, intersection at the top of the hill by Scotty's, bicycle safety on the main roads, and the speed of traffic off the Gill-Montague Bridge
- Ramsey reviews the plan to address the priorities (Main Street Pedestrian Improvements, improvements to the Unity/High/Millers Falls Road Area, additions to the Avenue A Crosswalk at First Street, and accommodations for bicycles from the Gill-Montague Bridge to the General Pierce Bridge).
- Ramsey reviews projects that are not being currently addressed, but hopefully will be in future rounds (Canal District Area, a sidewalk gap in Montague Street, traffic signals at A/3rd and A/7th, sidewalk on First Street, and 30 other smaller projects).
- The total grant application is \$397,400; the required Town Commitment for Design is approximately \$40,000.
- Nelson makes the motion to authorize the Town Planner to submit the application and authorize the Chair to sign the necessary documents. Boutwell seconded, unanimously approved. Nelson Aye, Boutwell Aye, Kuklewicz Aye

• Berkshire Gas Moratorium Update

Two weeks ago representatives from Berkshire Gas met with Ramsey and Ellis and informed them that the moratorium is going to continue indefinitely. They had looked at two technically feasible alternatives that would provide natural gas (a new distribution line that would tap into the main pipeline and new liquefied natural gas facility), but neither are financially feasible. They also explored several smaller measures, but concluded that they were not enough to lift the moratorium.

- Kuklewicz expressed that he has some reservations on the validity of some of their comments and would like to invite people from Berkshire Gas who may have some different perspectives to come and have more of a discussion.
- o Elan expressed concerns about "inconsistencies" with Berkshire Gas.

Jeff Singleton

Discussion Regarding Upcoming FRTA Board Meeting

- Regarding Sandy Lane project, they are not getting as much money as they thought they were getting.
 Singleton will let them know that Ramsey needs an update.
- Regarding the FY19 State budget, regional transit authorities are being allocated \$88 million; \$2 million is being allocated to RTAs that are running a deficit and \$4 million is going to a special fund. A special committee is going to be appointed to try to figure out what to do with the special fund. A group called the Transportation Advisory Committee (made up of riders and other interested advocates) will try to urge them to spend some of that \$4 million to insure that all regional transit authorities have some minimal level of weekend service.
- Singleton would like to meet with Kuklewicz and Ellis regarding a complaint that was received.
- Regarding Tina Cote's letter and her comments about funding, Singleton states that he has a proposal that would be revenue-neutral.
