- Updates on decarbonization plans for town buildings.
- Discussion regarding Specialized Stretch Code:
 - How sort out conflicting perspectives on Specialized Code?
 - Spray foam insulation has high total Global Warming Impact.
 - Report on discussion with building expert. (Ray & Sally)
 - Invite Paul Lipke to talk about likelihood that spray foam insulation would be used to meet Passive House standards for required for 12,000+ SF buildings under Specialized Code?
 - Reach out to local builders about their practices, how they meet Stretch Code, would meet Specialized Stretch Code, concerns, their questions?
 - Brief report on conversation with local builder. (Sally)
 - Discuss ideas re educating builders about Specialized Code.
 - Promote free Mass Save contractor trainings.
 - Other trainings?
 - Recommend that Town projects require spray foam insulation installer be a third party certified company and that the on-site installer be a certified installer, to avoid problems that are expensive & hard to fix retroactively? (Peter Yost & another builder require that for projects they oversee.)

Energy Related Town Facility Updates, including Schools. 5:42-5:50 PM

- Potential MEC input for Farren site development.
- Further discussion on the possibility of putting PV panels on the roof of the DPW & the Public Safety Complex, potentially with battery backup, and EV chargers for residents.
- MA Embodied Carbon Intergovernmental Council recommendations:
 - Municipalities not required to follow recommendations but can decide to:
 - Require Environmental Product Declarations (EDPs) for building and road project RFPs.
 - Use state model embodied carbon procurement from Mass Dept. of Transportation (DOT) & Division of Capital Asset Management & Maintenance (DCAMM).
 - Green Communities will lead municipalities on embodied carbon.
 - Harmonize municipal recommendations from Mass Climate Action Network (MCAN) for building RFPs.
 - HERS raters & embodied carbon:
 - Now able to recommend low embodied carbon building materials.
 - HERS score credits, incentives can drive low embodied carbon material use, according to MA 100 Home embodied carbon study.
 - Organize education for builders & residents on embodied carbon in building materials (especially as Farren plans being developed?)
