- 4. Understand how the parking system can be improved to better serve visitors, residents, and employees of all ages, abilities, and backgrounds





In most locations, overnight parking is not allowed during the winter




Some off-street lots are shared between two or more uses







Pre-pandemic weekday demand is low, with pockets of increased onstreet utilization on Fourth Street and Avenue A








Downtown Parking Demand Friday, April 1, 2022 - 3:00 PM






Downtown Parking Demand Friday, April 1, 2022 - 5:00 PM



Stakeholder Feedback



Two sessions held in late March

- Town staff (administrator, DPW, Police)
- Community stakeholders (businesses, property owners, DCR, Shea Theater)

Key pieces of feedback

- Avenue A should be reserved primarily for customers
- Parking can be difficult to find during peak periods (weekend evenings, Shea event)
- Avenue A does not accommodate short-term parking and loading/deliveries
- Signage could better direct motorists to available parking
- Snow parking ban is not consistently enforced





Short-Term Parking and Loading Zone Designations











